ALL STUDENTS: CURRICULUM AND ASSESSMENT (C&A)

- Performance Results: self-directed and reflected learning, inquiry and problem solving, connection to the work and their developing civic responsibility.
- In ELA/SS specifically, students are in a multi-grade course that integrates social studies and Language Arts that connect content areas.
- Curriculum development: C&A performance results are taught throughout all content areas and remain a focus of discussion at Clayton.



NEIGHBORHOOD ELP, HONORS COURSES

In addition to the C&A methodology, students in NELP/Honors will include:

Math: Students will engage with the same curriculum as C&A math but with more depth and complexity.

Accelerated Math: Seventh Grade Accelerated Honors Mathematics: 7th Grade – Full Year This course is designed to help meet the needs of gifted students that would not be challenged in the 7th grade honors class. This course will compact the curriculum of both 7th and 8th grade math into one year so that students will be able to take Secondary 1 Mathematics as 8th graders. (Math placement test required for this course.)

Secondary Math 1: This course is for 8th graders that complete the Accelerated Math course as a 7th grader. Students receive high school credit upon completion of this course.

Science NELP/H: This course is for students who are interested in challenging themselves to engage in three-dimensional science. Students are presented with more opportunities to be leaders, to collaborate, and to extend their learning.

ELA/SS: The NELP coursework consists of Language Arts, United States History/Utah History, and Reading in an interdisciplinary curriculum program designed for students chosen for their high academic ability.



MAGNET ELP

Science: Students are presented with challenging opportunities to interact with more breadth and depth of three-dimensional science. Students are engaged in more self-directed and project-based learning, make more connections to real world applications and disciplines, and are introduced to high school topics.

Language Arts & Social Studies: The Magnet ELP program is designed around project-based learning which gives students opportunities to question, explore, think critically, and problem solve. Students practice the scholarly habits of the mind as they collaborate with teams, learn to manage their time, and persevere through extended projects. In addition, MELP students learn the research process, and how to digest, analyze, and synthesize information.

Language: Recommended, but not required (Spanish/Chinese)
